FROM THE PASTOR

“A VISION FOR THE NEXT TWO OR THREE YEARS AT GOOD SHEPHERD”

We've not done any near-term planning for some time. Our long-term mission remains, “Every day, everywhere, by everyone . . . sharing the grace of the Good Shepherd.” But what should this look like over the next five years? How shall we focus our energies and resources?

What follows are my thoughts. I do not presume this to be the end of the discussion, just a starting point.

Families

First, the American family is in trouble. Many families are dysfunctional or broken. Single parents are stretched so thin they hardly know where to turn. Many children are trauma sensitive. Children also are experiencing anxiety and depression in part because of social media and increasing pressures at school. Young parents with children are also largely absent from most churches across the country, including our own. Therefore, I believe over the next five years we should invest in families, and we are well situated to do so.

Currently, we have 163 kids coming to our school. These children, I assure you, hear the Gospel of Jesus every single day. Their parents, however, do not. Many of our school parents have no church home and others are members of a church in name only. Only some of our school parents are active in this church or another. They entrust us with their kids, but it's a stretch to say they all want their children to receive a Christian education. I think what they mostly want is a good, alternative education in clean, bright, safe places where bullying isn't tolerated, and where general Christian values are taught. However, it's not a priority for them to be part of Word and Sacrament ministry in this church or any other.

A couple of years ago we started what we call “Family Night.” Typically, the Family Night begins with a meal, continues with a devotion, and ends with an art project for the family. We do not allow “kids tables.” (We are trying to help the family to spend *more* quality time together, not less.) The Family Night concept seems to have scratched an itch. On average, we have over 100 individuals. We are planning six of these this year alone.

We recently created a new part-time staff position at Good Shepherd. Working four hours a week, Michelle Gerlach is our Family Life Director. She has hit the ground running and is planning some wonderful events for families, including a workshop to teach the Love and Logic Model for Disciplining Children, a College Planning Workshop, and Cooking for the Family classes with a professional chef. At each of these events, we will make sure those in attendance hear the Gospel.

In addition, Charles and Jan Schadt will be facilitating Dave Ramsey's “Financial Peace” class beginning in January. We will surely encourage our parents to take this class, as financial stress is one of the leading factors that causes separation and divorce.

There's room for more. Should we consider calling a second pastor whose primary

emphasis would be on family ministry?

In any case, I believe the next five years should be marked by an investment of time, energy and resources in families.

Inactives

Like every church, Good Shepherd has a hefty number of members who have grown inactive. The elders regularly invest time and energy in reaching out to them, but this work requires the efforts of the whole church. Shepherding the strays is not an initiative. It's about being who God has called us to be: loving and caring for each other as the Body of Christ. I'd like to see each of us, in Christian love and concern, reach out in compassion, care and Christian love to one who has strayed. In Luke 15, Jesus tells the parable of the Lost Sheep. In it he describes the Shepherd's patient and loving search for one single sheep that has strayed from the pen. Jesus says the shepherd does not give up the search "until he finds it." Then follows the great celebration: "Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost."

Again, I'd like to see each of us make a concerted effort to do what God has called us to do as part of the Body of Christ. In Luke 19, Jesus said he came "to seek and to save the lost." The lost are not just "out there." Unfortunately, some are members of Good Shepherd.

Facilities and Property

We are on the home stretch of Phase 1 of the Sanctuary Project. There's no good reason to delay moving right into Phase 2, which will likely include putting new flooring down in the sanctuary and narthex, as well as the Fellowship Hall. It will include the installation of new audio-visual equipment in the sanctuary, and possibly re-upholstering the pew chairs. It will also include the installation of the two remaining stain glass windows somewhere other than in the sanctuary, and other changes of a more minor sort (e.g. adding an accent arch to the reredos altar wall and new tack boards to replace the crumbling cork boards in the Fellowship Hall.) I'd like to see all of this completed and paid for in time for our 50th anniversary in 2021 and believe it's very reasonable to achieve this goal.

We are currently mowing (at considerable expense) the hillside along the driveway. I'd love to help nature reclaim that area (!) from Main Street up to the community gardens. Paying to have it mowed once a week does not make a lot of sense to me, especially in a world of growing environmental concerns. We could restore it to a natural state with a meandering path for the enjoyment of the church and community, and for educational programming. I don't believe this would be an expensive proposition. Who knows, maybe we could even find a grant to help us install a pond in the wetlands for similar purposes!

Because the school is growing, we've come to the point of not having adequate classroom space. In addition, the lack of a gym is also becoming a greater challenge. (It was easier to bus 100 kids back and forth to Lebanon Lutheran for gym classes than it will be to bus 163 kids.) The school board is doing some long-range facilities planning that may include rearranging how we use our space. Additionally, it may include renting portable classrooms. The trustees also have a laundry list of items that need attention, such as the parking lot which will soon need another round of costly repairs or complete replacement.

As of the beginning of 8/31 our current long-term debt stands at \$220,711 and our short-term debt at \$78,500. Once these debts are mostly paid off, I would support starting the planning process to address our space needs.

Carry On

So, over the next five years, I submit we focus on ministering to families and inactives, and that we complete Phase 1 and Phase 2 of the Sanctuary Project while paying down our debt. Simultaneously, we must carry on with all the things we are currently doing. We must continue preaching and teaching the Word to adults and children, and administering the Sacraments. We must continue serving our neighbors in many and various ways (such as Sandwiches in the Park, Bread and Roses, SOS, etc.), and caring for one another through the work of the Parish Nurse, Stephen Ministry, home bound pastoral care, etc. We must carry on with all the things we are already doing!

This is my vision for the next five years. Tell me what you think. If I'm way off, or just partially off, jot down your thoughts and shoot me an email or give me a call. I promise I will read or listen to every comment given and collate them for others to consider as well. However, I do believe we should soon have a shared and common vision for the next five years.

“WHAT DO YOU SAY?”

- We incorporate technology at all grade levels through the use of SmartBoards, iPads, and classroom computers.
- “Meet the students where they are at” is the motto of every teacher in the building. That means that each child is provided with new learning challenges regardless of grade level ability.
- Social skills are part of everyday instruction as we strengthen children’s abilities to collaborate with others, communicate clearly, and treat others with respect.
- All classrooms are welcoming to trauma sensitive learners to help meet additional needs for these types of learners to give them the best chance at success in learning.
- We infuse our faith, Christian living, and the teaching of doctrine in all subject areas.

Sharing His Grace:

This is our faith in action.

- All staff members use Love & Logic discipline techniques. This puts the ownership of student behavior on the student in a loving yet accountable way.
- When settling conflicts students are guided to use the Biblical practices outlined in Matthew 18.
- Students often hear the words “I forgive you” and “I love you” from teachers and administration.
- Most importantly, students learn more about the love of God and the grace He continuously shows to each of us every single day.

You now have a launching point when answering the question, “What do you like about your school?” It all starts with our mission.

“FLU SEASON IS HERE”

Flu (Influenza) is a contagious disease that spreads throughout the US every year, usually between October and May. It can be very dangerous for infants and young children, people over 65, pregnant women and people with certain health conditions or a weakened immune system. For these individuals the flu can cause complications such as pneumonia, bronchitis, sinus infections, ear infections and even death. Each year thousands of people in the US die from the flu and many more are hospitalized.

The only good thing about the flu is that we have vaccines that can prevent it or decrease its severity. The vaccine is recommended for people 6 months through adulthood. It takes about 2 weeks after administration to develop protection. **The vaccine does not cause the flu!** Each year a new vaccine is developed based on flu strains encountered during the previous year. There is a vaccine specifically recommended for seniors over 65 which covers 4 different viruses (quadrivalent) which includes an additional B virus component.

The site of injection may have some soreness or redness the next day. You might experience mild muscle aches and headache as your body develops your immunity through the vaccine. It is recommended that you receive the vaccine before the end of October. Don't wait! Most pharmacies will administer the vaccine without appointments. You can also go to your personal MD or watch for community clinics.

What else can you do?

- Avoid people who are sick.
- Wash your hands frequently with soap and warm water for 20 seconds.
- Alcohol-based sanitizers are only recommended when water is not available.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth.
- Clean and disinfect surfaces that are touched frequently at home, school and work.
- Take good care of your body!
- Get plenty of sleep
- Drink plenty of water.
- Eat food high in nutrients like vegetables, fruits, and nuts.
- Stay physically active.
- Manage stress.
- Stay home when you're sick.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze.
- Dispose of tissues immediately and cleanse your hands.

“GOD CREATES A WORLD AND A KINGDOM”

We are beginning a new Sunday School Program this year! It is titled “God Creates a World and a Kingdom”. The format is also changing with more large group activities and all grades will be covering the same topics!

During the month of October, your children’s Sunday School classes will be discussing the following Bible lessons:

10/6 Lesson 5, Introduction to the Lords Prayer:

Jacob undeservedly receives his father’s blessing—he and his offspring will dwell in the land of Canaan. As the days of Isaac’s life approach their end, Jacob rightly fears for his life. Following the urging of Isaac and Rebekah, Jacob sets out for the house of his uncle Laban. Along the way, Jacob dreams of a staircase reaching to heaven, with the Lord Himself standing at the top. The preincarnate Christ repeats God’s promise to give this land to Jacob and his descendants.

10/13 Lesson 6, The First Article, Part 2:

The account of Jacob’s favorite son, Joseph, is a turning point in the history of God’s people. The unusual timeline of Joseph’s life includes him being despised by his brothers, sold into slavery, attaining success and then losing it all to false accusations, being imprisoned, and serving the court of Pharaoh. Joseph summarizes his life in one sentence addressed to his brothers: “You meant evil against me, but God meant it for good” (Genesis 50:20).

10/20 Lesson 7, The First Petition:

Miraculously rescued through the waters of the Nile by Pharaoh’s daughter, Moses escapes the condemnation pronounced on the other Hebrew boys. Leaving behind his life of privilege, Moses flees to Midian, where he encounters the living God in a burning bush. Through this encounter, God directs and equips Moses to rescue His chosen people from their slavery in Egypt.

10/27 Lesson 8, The Nature of the Sacrament of the Altar:

Following ten terrible plagues, Pharaoh relents and releases the Israelites to worship in the wilderness. Realizing the Israelites have no intention of returning, Pharaoh’s army pursues the runaways. Caught between Pharaoh’s charioteers and the waters of the Red Sea, the people cry out to God. Moses stretches his hand over the sea as God parts the waters, enabling the people to pass through the sea on dry ground. As Egypt’s army attempts to follow, the sea closes in over them, so not one survives.

Please talk with your children each Sunday and listen to them as they tell you about the lessons they’ve learned in Sunday School.
